Dear Parents, Reading
This week we will review consonants R, W, J, K and short vowel E andConsonants V, Y, Z, Qu and short vowel U. We will continue practicing blending sounds to make words.
We will work on identifying sounds in words and learning to recognize syllables.

We will begin Unit 1 Week 1 this Friday. We will have our weekly tests and spelling tests on Thursday. This coincides with our computer lab time. We will take a spelling prestest on Friday. The spelling words will come home with the homework. The list will be available on the website next weekend.

## Math

We have completed our math units with Chapter 1: Addition Concepts

We will begin Chapter 2: Subtraction Concepts. We will subtract numbers from 10 or less. We will show taking from a number with pictures. We will model taking from a group. We will model taking apart. We will solve subtraction problems by making a model. We will use pictures to compare and subtract. We will use models to compare and subtract. We will tell what happens when we subtract 0 from a number. We will show all the ways to take apart a number. We will tell why some subtraction facts are easy to subtract. The Chapter 2 test should be Tuesday October $11^{\text {th }}$.

## Homework

Just a reminder. The ONLY homework is what comes home in the newsletter. Papers that come home during the week are things we have worked on, usually that day. They are practice work. Due to time they may or may not be complete. It is good review for your Neptune if you ask them to explain what we did, but the papers do not need to be completed if they are not done and they do not need to be returned unless there is a note asking for it to be.

## Day 1

Have your child write the letter $r$ and tell you the sound for $r$. Then take turns saying words that start with $r$, such as roll, ring, rabbit, rock, rake, and ribbon. How many words can you name?

## Day 2

Have your child write the letters $w$ and $j$ and tell you the sound for each letter. Write each of these words on a card or piece of paper: job, ran, wig, jam, jot, rig, wag, rag. Place the cards facedown on a table. Take turns picking a card and saying the word aloud.

## Day 3

This week your child is learning the letters $r, w$, $j$, and $k$. Write these words on a sheet of paper: Kim, jar, rim, wag, kit, jog, win, rid. Spell out a word (j-a-r) and ask your child to say the word aloud. Then ask your child to find the word and circle it on the paper.

## Day 4

Write these words and have your child read them: $h e, i s, t o$ with, three. Write sentences together, using one or more of these words in each sentence. Have your child read the sentences aloud.

This week your child is learning more about the plot in a story. Read a story to your child. Have your child tell you the events, or what happens, in the story.

## Day 2

Have your child write the letters $y$ and $z$ and tell you the sound for each letter. Work together to name words that start with each letter, such as yellow, zero, zone, zoo, yarn, yard, and zipper.

## Day 3

This week your child is learning the letters $v, y, z$, and $u$. Write these words on a sheet of paper: vet, van, hut, yak, sun, zip, yes, yet, dug, put. Spell out a word ( $s-u-n$ ) and have your child say the word aloud. Then ask your child to find and circle the word on the paper.

## Day 4

Write these words and have your child read them: where, here, for, me, go. Write sentences together, using one or more of these words in each sentence. Have your child read the sentences aloud.

## Day 5

This week your child is learning more about the realism and fantasy in a story. Read a make-believe story to your child. Have your child tell why the characters and/or the events are make-believe.
