Reading

We will do Reading Street Unit 4 Week 3. Our spelling and reading tests will be Thursday. The Unit 4 focus is what do we treasure. The question of the week is what treasures can we find in our country. Our story this week is "A Trip To Washington D.C." We will learn to read, segment and blend words with digraphs oa and ow, and three letter consonant blends. (coat, loaf, blow, grown, scrub, shrub, splash, strange, etc). We will learn to identify facts and details. We will work on reading sentences with correct expression and tone. We will learn to name adjectives that tell size.

Math

We will continue Chapter 9: Measurement. We will measure length and tell time. We will order objects by length. We will compare lengths of three objects to put them in order. We will measure length using nonstandard units. We will use a nonstandard measuring tool to measure length. We will tell how acting it out can help us solve measurement problems. We will tell time to the hour on a clock that has only an hour hand. We will tell time to the half hour on a clock that has only an hour hand. We will tell why the minute hand and hour hand are different for time to the hour and time to the half hour. We will tell whether to draw and write time to the hour or half hour. The Chapter 9 test should be March 28th.



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Here are ways to help your child practice skills while having fun!

Day 1

Write these long *o* words: *load*, *float*, *toast*, *show*. One player reads a word, and the other thinks of one or more rhyming words.

Day 2

Write the following three-letter blends in red on index cards: *scr*, *spl*, *squ*, *str*, *thr*. Write the following word parts in blue on other cards: *ap*, *ub*, *ash*, *int*, *are*, *eeze*, *ew*, *ing*, *eam*, *ead*. Together, match up the blends to the word endings to make real words.

Day 3

Write the following words in a list: *found*, *mouth*, *once*, *took*, *wild*. Take turns picking one of the words and making up a riddle to help the other players guess the chosen word.

Day 4

Write each spelling word on a card: *boat, road, snow, row, yellow, loaf, coat, soap, blow, pillow.* Have your child read the words. Then take turns dictating a word and writing it.


Day 5

Row Your Boat!

Materials paper circle, paper clip, pencils, 1 button per player

Game Directions

- 1. Make a simple spinner as shown. On a large sheet of paper, make a game path in the shape of a stream with 12 spaces. Make boat cards like the ones shown on page 3 using the words at the bottom of page 3. Shuffle them and place them in a pile next to the game path.
- 2. Before spinning, a player picks a boat card and reads aloud the word on the card. If the word is read correctly, then he or she spins and moves the number of spaces shown on the spinner. Players get one turn per spin. If the word is read incorrectly, play passes to the next player, and the card goes back to the bottom of the pile.
- 3. The first player to reach End wins!
