Reading

We will do Reading Street Unit 4 Week 4. Our spelling and reading tests will be Thursday. The Unit 4 focus is what do we treasure. The question of the week is why do we treasure special places. Our story this week is "A Southern Ranch." We will learn to read, segment and blend words with digraphs ie and igh, and consonant patterns kn and wr. (tied, piece, sight, knee, wrap, etc). We will learn to identify facts and details. We will work on reading sentences accurately and more quickly with correct expression and tone. We will learn to name adjectives that tell what kind.

Math

We will complete Chapter 9: Measurement. The Chapter 9 test should be March 28th.

We will begin Chapter 10: Represent Data. We will tell how graphs and charts help us organize, represent, and interpret data. We will tell what the pictures in a picture graph show. We will make a picture graph to answer a question. We will read a bar graph to find the number that a bar shows. We will tell how a bar graph can help us compare information. We will count the tallies on a tally chart. We will tell why a tally chart is a good way to show information that we have collected. We will tell how showing information in a graph can help us solve problems.




Day 5

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How High For Pie?

 ${\displaystyle \textbf{Materials}} \hspace{0.1 cm} \text{index cards, scissors, crayon, coin} \hspace{0.1 cm}$

Game Directions

- 1. Cut out small pie shapes and have each player write his or her name on one.
